St. Peter's Basilica in Rome: Peter to Present

Chair: Tod Marder, Rutgers University

St. Peter's Basilica in Rome has acquired an iconic status as the central church of Christendom . Although every aspect of it has been studied, from the archaeology of its origins to its embellishment in the Baroque to the controversial recent restorations, there is still much to learn about the fabric and its decoration. This session is designed to advance the broad history of art and architecture of St. Peter's through papers treating its long history from the time of Constantine to the present day. Discussions may concern form and meaning, structure and intention, as well as related historical and cultural matters. Papers that relate the building and its decoration to the development of the Vatican palace will also be given serious consideration. The influence of St. Peter's is everywhere, and each bit of its history has the potential to be understood as widely as our cultural parameters will allow.
